

Captain BALL has just completed his first year as Professor of Naval Science at Oregon State University. His leadership and inspiration have continued to build the OSU NROTC Unit and further its reputation as the finest unit in the nation.

Captain BALL entered the Navy in 1951 through the Naval Aviation Cadet Flight Training Program after completion of his studies at the University of Washington and at the University of Puget Sound. COMMANDER RALPH H. REILEY, United States Navy

Commander Ralph H. REILEY assumed the duties as Executive Officer of Oregon State University's Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Unit in November of 1977.

Commander REILEY received his undergraduate degree from Muhlenberg College and his graduate degree from Rutgers University's School of Law and was commissioned 4 May 1957, after completing Officer Candidate School. He began his naval career as legal officer on the USS LAKE CHAMPLAIN (CVS 39), and served additional sea tours as operations officer on the USS WILTSIE (DD 716) and executive officer of the USS BENNER (DD 807). From February, 1968, to September, 1969, he commanded the USS CALCATERRA (DER 390) homeported in Key West, Florida.

A 1970 graduate of the Defense Intelligence School, Commander REILEY distinguished himself as a logistics plans officer for MAC V in Saigon, Vietnam, from February to November, 1972. Just prior to his current assignment, he served as an intelligence officer with the Defense Intelligence Agency in Washington, D.C. Commander REILEY is a proven intelligence subspecialist.



This new feature allows active duty officers the option of a second regular membership increasing the permanent life coverage to a total of \$34,000 under our new DOUBLE COVERAGE program without further evidence of insurability, provided:

(a) the option is exercised within 30 days following the anniversary of membership nearest the member's 25th, 30th, 35th, or 40th birthday; or

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-General Nathanael Greene South Carolina, 1781

For eight long months, General Nathanael Greene and his patchwork army of rugged militia and rawboned backwoodsmen fought battle after battle against a well-equipped, numerically superior British armed force. Time and again, the Americans were beaten back or withdrew. But they did, indeed, rise and fight again. It was precisely this kind of dogged determination that won America its freedom from the Crown in the Revolutionary War.

Always short of men, money and supplies, Greene couldn't afford to risk full-scale war against the might of the British. But he could use his tough, highly mobile forces to fragment the British fighting strength at various strong points and cut off their vital supply routes. And this he did.

Using startling hit-and-run guerrilla tactics against the rigidly formal brand of British warfare, Greene's strategy paid off. He won the war in the South. Each time the daring General and his men struck and pulled back, obstinately attacked and expeditiously evaded, they so crippled the Redcoats that the treaty of October 19, 1781, was inevitable.

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
